How to Clean a Leather Office Chair?

1. List of Supplies for Cleaning Leather Office Chairs

• Soft fabric or microfiber towel

Used to remove dirt and light stains without scratching the leather surface. Lint-free microfiber towels are recommended as they do not leave lint or scratches.

Vacuum cleaner with brush attachment

Can effectively suck up dust and debris from leather crevices. Choose a soft bristle brush head to avoid scratching the leather.

• Leather cleaner (commercial or homemade)

Cleaners designed for leather can remove stubborn stains without damaging the leather. Homemade cleaners often use natural ingredients such as white vinegar or lemon juice.

• Leather Conditioner

Used to moisturize leather after cleaning to prevent dryness and cracking and prolong the life of the leather. Conditioner also restores the shine of the leather.

Distilled Water

Mixed with a leather cleaner, it reduces limescale and protects leather from hard water.

Mild soaps

If you choose to make your own cleaner, you can use mild soap as a base ingredient and mix it with water to remove stains effectively.

2. Leather office chair pre-cleaning preparation
