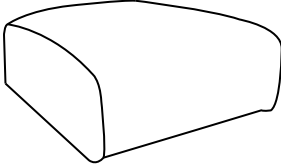
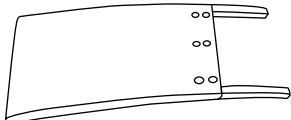
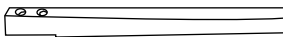
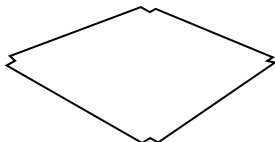
- ⊘  • Not for commercial use. For residential use only.
 - ✓  • Furniture may scratch floors. We recommend using furniture pads to protect your floors.
 - ⊘  • Do not put hot items directly on furniture surface.
 - ⊘  • Do not clean furniture with harsh cleansers or polish.
 - ⊘  • Do not place furniture under direct sunlight.
 - ⊘  • Do not place furniture near heating or cooling vents.
 - ⊘  • Do not write on furniture without a padded barrier to protect the surface.
 - ⊘  • Do not place furniture outside . For indoor use only.
 - ⊘  • Stains may be removed with mild soap solution and damp cloth.
 - ⊘  • Children should not climb or jump on the furniture.
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- ✓  • Dust and pick-up spills using a clean, non-colored, lint-free cloth.

Please look in carton for hardware packs and legs.
Sets often ship in multiple boxes and may arrive a day or two apart.

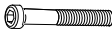

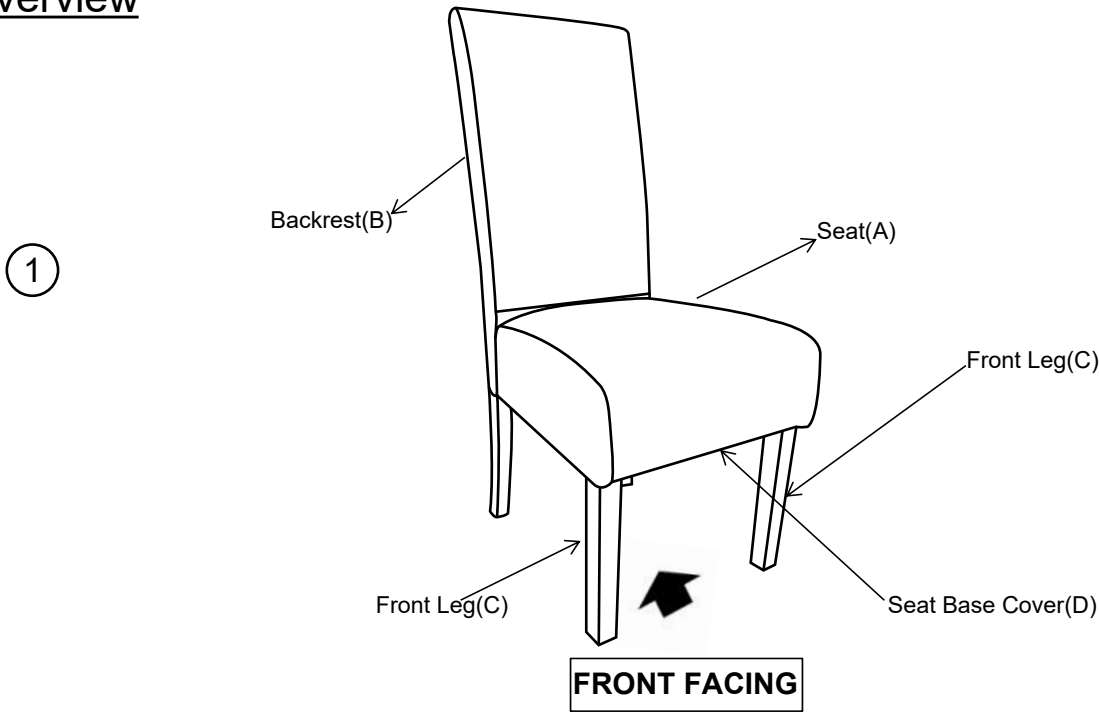
Assembly Preparation

-  • Read instructions, cover to cover-
-  • Have 2 adults on hand for assembly-
-  • Do not assemble on flooring or carpet-
-  • Assemble on a clean non-marring surface (packing foam)-
-  • Save all packaging until finished-

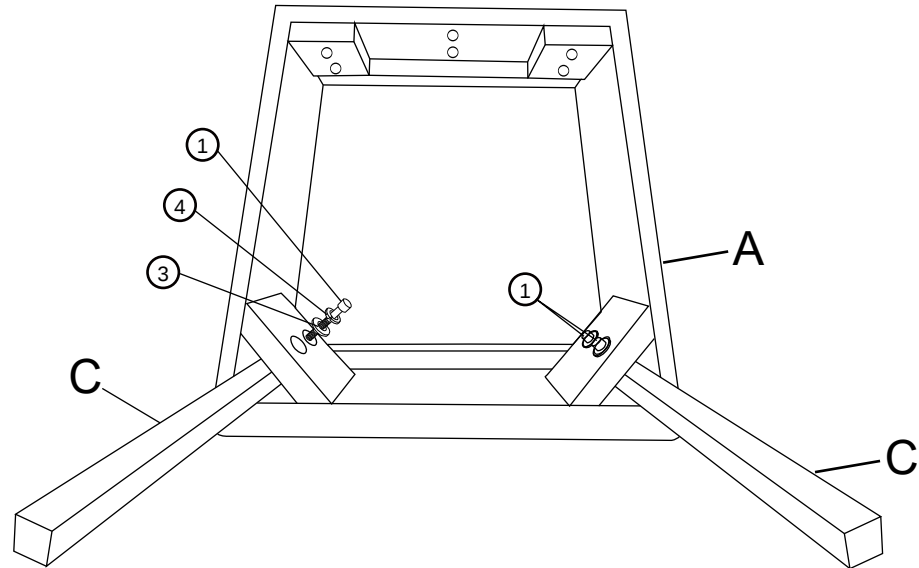
Assembly Steps

Overview



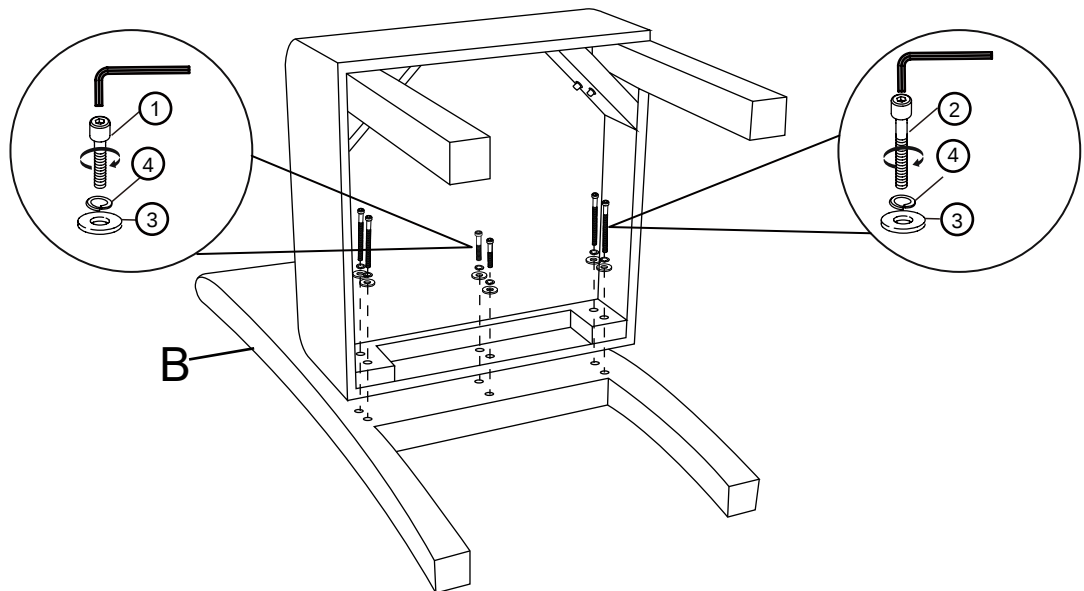
This Dining Chair has multiple parts and may require up to 30 minutes to assemble. To give you an overview of the Dining Chair parts, the above picture is to help you put the various parts into perspective. Please read through the instructions below to familiarise yourself with the parts and steps before assembly.

Step 1



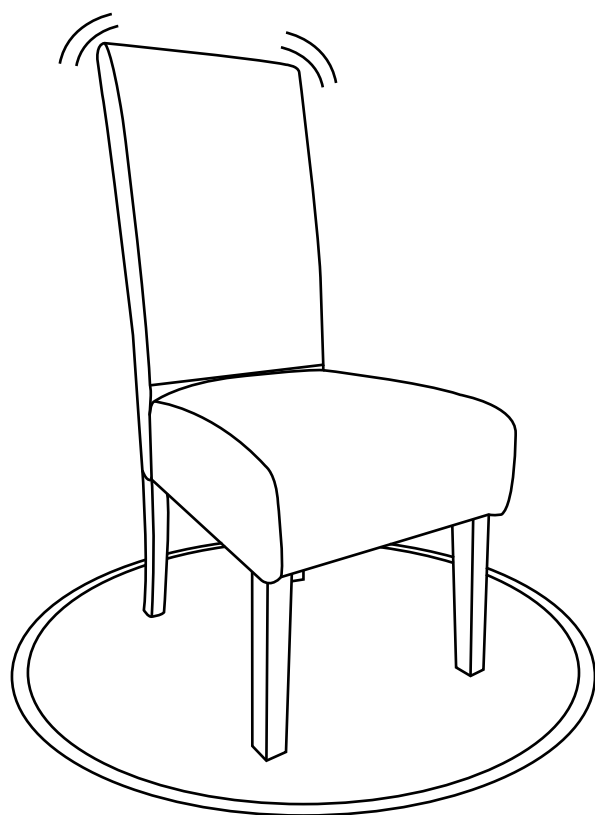
Stand the seat (A) upright and attach the washers and two front legs using 4 screws (1)

Step 2

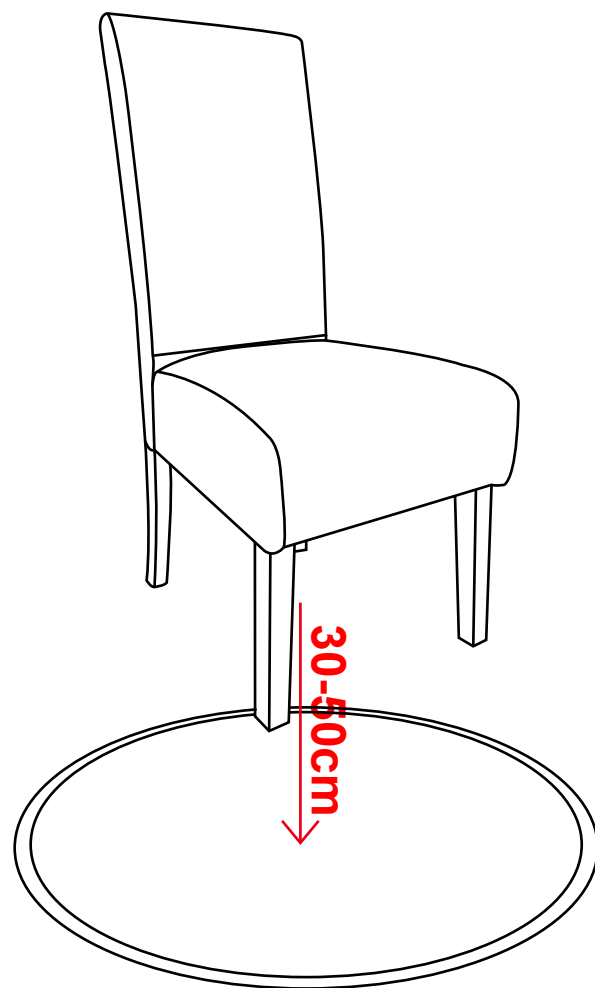


Lay the assembled parts horizontally and attach the backrest using 4 (2), 2 (1) screw, 6 flat washers (3), and 6 spring washers (4).

Step 3

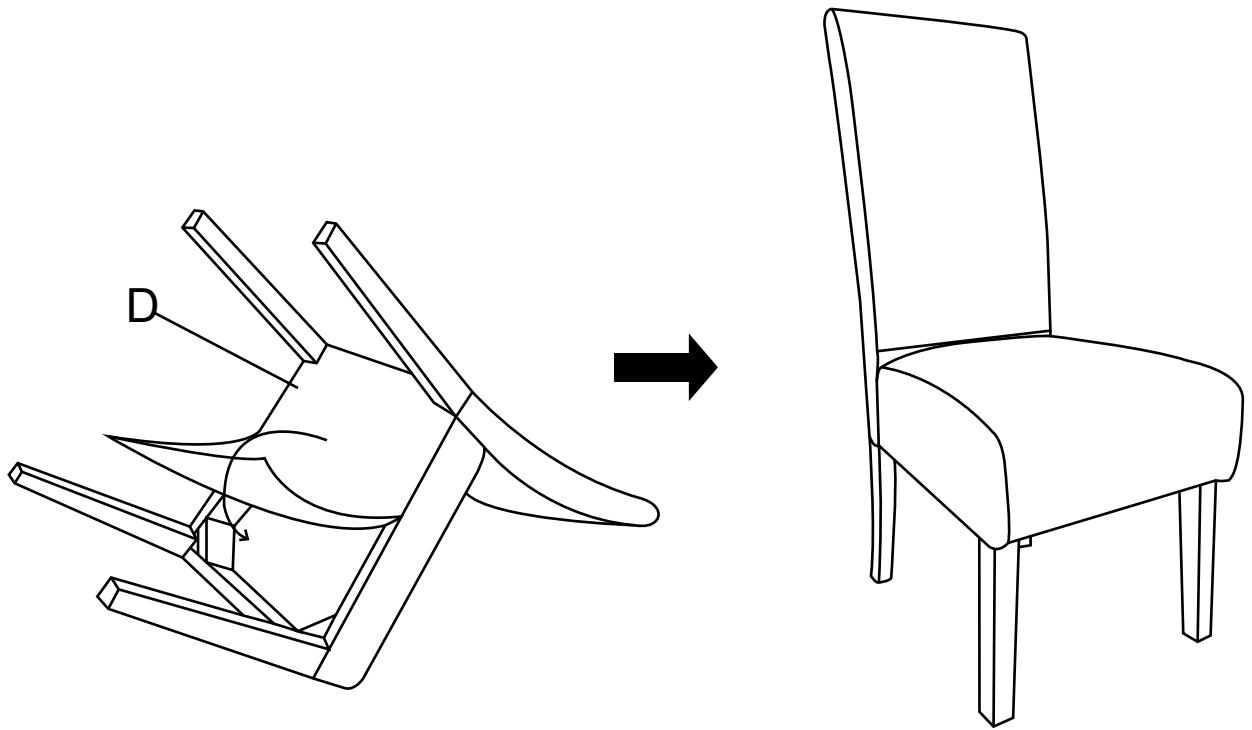


Wobble test



Place the chair on a **LEVEL SURFACE** to see if it wobbles.
If it wobbles, lift the chair to some 30cm to 50cm height from the ground.
Keep your feet and toes well away from the drop zone.
Drop the chair freely and vertically with the four legs, hitting the ground, at the same time.
This Drop Test will help to ensure that all the bolts and gaps to all reach full alignment status.
Test again for evenness on a **LEVEL SURFACE**.
If no wobbles found, proceed to tighten all the bolts.
CAUTION : When tightening these bolts, tighten sequentially.
DO NOT tighten any screw fully and then towards the next one.
This would cause the frame to warp.
If there is still wobbles, loosen the bolts and execute this same drop tests.
WARNING!! IF CHAIR IS NOT STABLE , IT COULD LEAD TO DAMAGING THE PRODUCT

Step4



**Finally, seal the Seat Base Cover(D) back on to the underside of the chairseat .
Turn it the right side up.Make sure all parts are connected and securely locked into
positionYour Chair is ready for use.
This Dining Chair can only be used on a flat, level surface**

Questions & Answers about Proposition 65

- What is Proposition 65?

Proposition 65 requires businesses to provide warnings to Californians about significant exposures to chemicals that cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. These chemicals can be in the products that Californians purchase, in their homes or workplaces, or that are released into the environment. By requiring that this information be provided, Proposition 65 enables Californians to make informed decisions about their exposures to these chemicals.

Proposition 65 also prohibits California businesses from knowingly discharging significant amounts of listed chemicals into sources of drinking water.

Proposition 65 requires California to publish a list of chemicals known to cause cancer, birth defects or other reproductive harm. This list, which must be updated at least once a year, has grown to include approximately 900 chemicals since it was first published in 1987.

- What types of chemicals are on the Proposition 65 list?

The list contains a wide range of naturally occurring and synthetic chemicals that include additives or ingredients in pesticides, common household products, food, drugs, dyes, or solvents. Listed chemicals may also be used in manufacturing and construction, or they may be byproducts of chemical processes, such as motor vehicle exhaust.

- What does a warning mean?

If a warning is placed on a product label or posted or distributed at a workplace, a business, or in rental housing, the business issuing the warning is aware or believes that it is exposing individuals to one or more listed chemicals.

By law, a warning must be given for listed chemicals unless the exposure is low enough to pose no significant risk of cancer or is significantly below levels observed to cause birth defects or other reproductive harm.
